




A Closer Look at the Virginia Synodical Women's Organization

Our workshops this year were really informative and thought-provoking. Our first awareness session was given by Josh Carter, on the staff of Mended Women in Abingdon, and his special guest Vickie, a former resident there. They introduced us to Mended Women, our 2025-26 Love Offering recipient. They shared the mission of Mended Women and Vickie is a great example of how this

Our second session on Saturday morning was "Care of Creation: We have come so far, but we have so far to go" presented by Jody Smiley. She took us through the history of environmental issues and

Protecting Our Planet" presented by Nicole Ocheltree. She talked with us about products and hidden ingredients that could be harmful to the environment and ourselves. She also gave us ways that we can make informed decisions concerning the planet and our health when making purchases.

At the 2025 Women's Synod Convention, the Reference and Council Committee read the resolution on Period Poverty and recommended its adoption. Voting members then voted to adopt the resolution on Period Poverty.

What is Period Poverty? Period Poverty is something that many of us have thankfully never experienced, but unfortunately many do. Those who menstruate often do not have the financial means or have convenient access to menstrual supplies. The resolution addresses these issues.

The resolution adopted on Period Poverty, can be found on page 4. The VSWO Officers and Board Members are encouraging all groups that gather to view the video linked in the resolution which highlights southwestern Virginia healthcare issues. Also, please select an organization to donate menstrual supplies. We need to become comfortable talking about menstruation and menstrual supplies even with the men in our lives. This is a healthcare necessity.

## PERIOD POVERTY RESOLUTION

The following resolution is related to how we as Women of the ELCA can educate ourselves on women's health issues.

To be aware of the healthcare obstacles facing women, and persons of color, and the LGBTQIA+ community.

WHEREAS, the December 9, 2024, Virginia Synod Justice for Women Tapestry Zoom led by Pastor Kelly Bayer Derrick, Pastor Kayla Keilholtz and Sylvia Vick-Eley was entitled Obstacles in Women's Healthcare & Health Education <a href="https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=DieT9QaeOoU">https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=DieT9QaeOoU</a>; and

WHEREAS, healthcare and health education for women, persons of color and the LGBTQIA+ community have come a long way and still have a long way to go; and

WHEREAS, healthcare services and supplies are difficult to obtain here in Virginia, especially in the southwestern part of the state, not just in Third World countries; and

WHEREAS, statistics show that approximately 1 in 10 students globally and 1 in 4 students in the United States miss one (1) week a month due to their periods, and adults miss out on job opportunities for advancement due to lack of access, funds or both to obtain menstrual products; and

WHEREAS, the need is great for us to spread awareness and educate about women's healthcare and advocate for women's health globally and in Virginia; and

WHEREAS, faith communities can help raise awareness and start the discussion about the health needs of women, young girls and those who identify as female; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that each congregational unit watch together or individually the Tapestry interview by Pastor Kayla Keilholtz with healthcare workers in Marion, Virginia on Women's Health and Education in Rural Southwestern Virginia and discuss; and be it further

RESOLVED, that in our churches we will have menstrual supplies available in the women's bathrooms and at women's events; and be it further

RESOLVED, that in our communities we will donate to food banks, women's shelters, and homeless organizations menstrual supplies; and be it further

RESOLVED, that all women of the VSWO be encouraged to obtain more information from organizations such as Days for Girls <a href="https://www.daysforgirls.org/">https://www.daysforgirls.org/</a>; and be it further

RESOLVED, that as Women of the ELCA we will continue to bring awareness to the topic of period poverty and other healthcare needs of women.
